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I. BACKGROUND

The United Nations – Asian and Pacific Training Centre for ICT for Development (UN-APCICT/ESCAP) was established in June 2006 as a regional institute of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP) in Incheon, Republic of Korea. The mission of APCICT is to build the human and institutional capacity of the 62 ESCAP member and associate member States to use ICTs for socio-economic development and attainment of the Millennium Development Goals. To achieve its mission, APCICT delivers ICT human capacity building services through four distinct yet inter-related pillars of its work, namely serving as a multilateral cooperation mechanism, training, research and knowledge sharing, and advisory services.

Since its inception, APCICT has designed and executed many impactful ICT for development (ICTD) capacity building programmes to bridge the digital divide. The Centre's flagship training programme is the Academy of ICT Essentials for Government Leaders ('Academy'), which aims to impart training using a 10-module curriculum to policymakers and government officials for leveraging the potential of ICTs for achieving national development goals. Since its launch, the Academy has been rolled-out out in 26 countries in the region. The Academy is currently available in 10 languages

The Academy in Myanmar

APCICT has partnered with the Union Civil Service Board (UCSB) of the Union of Myanmar to conduct Academy trainings. The first national Academy workshop was organized at the Central Institute of Civil Service (CICS) in Pyin Oo Lwin (Upper Myanmar) from March 29 – April 3, 2010. Fifty senior and mid-level government officials and trainers from 18 Ministries received training on Modules 1, 2 and 3 in order to enhance their skills and capacities to leverage ICTs for socio-economic development. This was also the first such workshop focused on ICT for development in the public sector in Myanmar. The Myanmar version of Modules 1, 2 and 3 were translated by the UCSB of Myanmar in 2011. The Second ICT Capacity Building Workshop was organized in Phaunggyi from 7-12 March, 2011. Over 50 government officials and trainers from 21 Ministries received training on Modules 4, 6 and 7.

Module 3, 'e-Government Applications'

e-Government is generally defined as "the use of digital technologies to transform

government operations in order to improve effectiveness, efficiency and service delivery to its citizens." Module 3 is a comprehensive introduction on e-government that showcases various essential ICT applications in delivering e-government, including their key elements and concepts, principles and types of applications, strategies and important determinant factors in successfully implementing e-government and a future roadmap. It also discusses how an e-government system is built by providing detailed analyses of exemplar systems and identifying design considerations.

Module 6, 'Information Security and Privacy'

As ICT becomes more prevalent in today's highly networked world, policymakers and other government officials need to understand how to ensure secure systems while maintaining user privacy. In an environment filled with aggressive hackers and attackers, networked systems in developing economies are just as, if not more, vulnerable to network sniffers, denial of service attacks, malicious code such as worms or viruses, and hacker attacks as are developed countries. Module 6 provides participants with a high-level understanding of the current threats to ICT security and helps them understand the safeguards governments need to take to ensure secure ICT systems. However, to ensure technology adoption by many users, this security must not come at the expense of abuses to users' privacy. Therefore, this module also discusses issues pertaining to ensuring user privacy.

II. OBJECTIVES

The workshop aimed to fulfill the following objectives:

- Increase awareness and build capacities of government officials and trainers on e-Government applications (Module 3) as well as on information security and privacy protection (Module 6);
- Discuss further national roll-out strategies of the Academy and Modules 3 and 6; and
- Strengthen existing partnerships and build new ones in order to extend the reach and impact of the Academy.

The workshop was attended by 50 mid-level government officials and trainers from various ministries, state and regional governments, and parliament. See Annex II for List of Participants.

V. ORGANIZATION OF THE WORKSHOP

The meeting opened with Welcome Remarks from His Excellency U Kyaw Thu, Chairman of the Union Civil Board of the Republic of Myanmar and a Welcome Statement from Dr. Hyeun-Suk Rhee, Director of UN-APCICT (delivered by Robert de Jesus, Programme Officer, APCICT).

Following the Opening Session, training on E-Government Applications was delivered by Dr. Nag Yeon Lee, APCICT consultant, and Dr. Kwangsok Oh of the National Information Society Agency of Korea. Both are co-authors of the module and served as resource persons for the workshop. The session, which ran over the next two days, from 13-14 May 2013, trained the participants on the basic concepts and principles of e-Government, and types of e-Government applications, the strategic planning process for e-Government, and some best practices in e-Government applications based on types of interaction

On 15 May 2013, the third day of the workshop, participants visited Yatanarpon Cyber City, Myanmar's first cybercity and the University of Technology (in Yatanarpon Cyber City), as part of a field study.

The last two days, 16-17 May 2013, was devoted to training on Information Security and Privacy, delivered by Mr. Freddy Tan, Microsoft and Mr. Yun Jae Suk of the Korean Internet Security Agency. This module provided an overview of the need for information security, information security issues and trends, and the process and methodology for formulating an information security strategy.

Certificates of attendance were awarded to all participants at the Closing Session of the workshop. Dr. Kyaw Kyw Htay, Member of the Union Civil Service Board, delivered the Closing Remarks.

VI. KEY OUTCOMES

- Representatives from the Union Civil Service Board of Myanmar expressed their appreciation to APCICT for the valuable training provided to the country's government officials. 50 government officials had been trained as a result of the workshop.
- H.E. U Kyaw Thu and H.E. Dr. Kyaw Kyaw, in their respective remarks during the Opening and Closing Sessions, both noted the crucial role of building capacities of Myanmar government officials on using ICT for socio-economic development and would like APCICT to continue to deliver its ICTD programmes in the country in the future.
- H.E. U Kyaw Thu, UCSB Chairman, requested assistance from APCICT in developing an ICTD professional development course that will be based on the Centre's Academy modules. The course will be a rigorous and intensive ICT for development course intended for Myanmar's senior government officials
- Dr. Aung Win, Professor and Principal of University of Technology (Yatanarporn CyberSecurity) expressed his University's interest in developing an ICTD curriculum based on the Academy programme. He also expressed support in rolling out APCICT's Primer Series on Youth in his university.
